## Stars in the Park programs begin Tuesday with rare Venus transit

FROSTBURG — The Cumberland Astronomy Club begins its 2012 Stars in the Park public stargazing programs with a special program Tuesday.

A little after 6 p.m., the planet Venus will begin a transit across the face of the setting sun. These transits are rare and the next one won't



be at 6:04 p.m., and second contact is predicted to be 6:21 p.m. Timing data from Frostburg and Meyersdale can be combined with measurements from other locations to calculate the distance from the Earth to the sun. Venus should be about halfway through the transit when the sun sets around 8:30 p.m.
